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1. About the College, Vision, Mission

Mar Baselios College of Engineering and Technology (MBCET), Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala was established in 2002 by the Malankara Catholic Educational Society of the Major Archdiocese of Trivandrum of the Syro Malankara Catholic Church, under the Holy See, with the noble objective of providing quality technical education that epitomizes noble values as well. The College is affiliated to the APJ Abdul Kalam Technological University and has been conferred with the Autonomous status by the University Grants Commission (UGC) in July 2020 and University and has notified the same in September 2020. The College is accredited by NAAC with 'A' Grade (CGPA: 3.13) since 2016 and is valid till 31 December 2025. All the B.Tech Programmes are accredited by NBA since 2016.

During the year under report (2021-2022), the College has offered five B. Tech Programmes in five branches, namely CE, CS, EC, EE and ME, each with an intake of 120 seats and five M. Tech Programmes in five specializations each with a sanctioned intake of 18 seats. The College is an approved Research Centre under the affiliating University. There are roughly 2000 students enrolled for the various Programmes spread across the Departments during the year under report.

Vision:

To be an Institution moulding globally competent Professionals as epitomes of noble Values.

Mission:

To transform the Youth as technically competent, ethically sound and socially committed Professionals, by providing a vibrant learning ambience, for the welfare of humanity.

2. About Autonomous Status

UGC has conferred the Autonomous Status in July 2020. APJ Abdul Kalam Technological University has notified the conferment of Autonomous Status in September 2020. The Autonomy was granted by the UGC for a period of 10 years (2020-21 to 2029-30). The College is looking at Autonomy as an opportunity to offer the Programmes with greater flexibility and relevance, with a view to further improve the quality of education and for achieving academic excellence. The College continues to be affiliated to the APJ Abdul Kalam Technological University. So, the degrees will be awarded to the students by the University based on the recommendation of the College. The name of the College will be mentioned in the Degree Certificates. The College Management has constituted the statutory bodies like Governing Body, Academic Council, and the Boards of Studies as per the extant rules and regulations, in October 2020. The meetings of these bodies have been conducted regularly. First batch of students were admitted to B. Tech and M. Tech programmes under autonomy through the approved admission process and the classes were started in November 2020. The Second batch was admitted in October-November 2021. The first batch of M. Tech students under autonomy will be graduating shortly in 2022-2023.

3. Academic activities undertaken

3.1 Results -2017-2021 B. Tech Batch

Despite the pandemic conditions that prevailed in the State from March 2020 onwards, the B. Tech students have performed well in the academics. The 2017-2021 batch has graduated during the year under report. The following Table A shows the overall pass in the different Programmes.

3.2 Curriculum Design and Development

Pursuant to the conferment of the Autonomy, the College has undertaken the curriculum design and development in 2020-2021 itself. In order to enable a smoother transition, the same curriculum of the affiliating University was adopted and suitable changes were made in the syllabi and regulations. The factors considered during the design of the curriculum were (i) the curricular structure of the affiliated university (KTU), (ii) the Model curriculum prescribed by AICTE (iii) recommendations by the Industry Experts and Alumni and (iv) the relevance of the topics in the context of recent advances in technology. Same curriculum was followed for the 2021 Admission batch as well because there were three curricular schemes were running, namely (a) KTU 2015 scheme, (b) KTU 2019 scheme and (c) the Autonomy scheme and it was necessary to ensure proper delivery in all the schemes, without a heavy burden for the faculty.

The Institution is practicing Outcome Based Education (OBE) from the academic year 2014-2015 onwards for all Programmes. Accordingly, each of the B. Tech/M.Tech Programme is pivoted on its Programme Educational Objectives and the Programme Specific Outcomes. We have adopted the general Programme Outcomes specified by the National Board of Accreditation (NBA) as such, while we have added the Programmes specific objectives coined

by our own team for each of the Programmes. Each individual course in the Curricula has its Course Objectives/Course Outcomes (CO). We use the Bloom's Taxonomy to specify the level of learning attainment expected on an average basis for each CO, as required under OBE The process of curriculum design is as follows:

- (a) One faculty/group of faculty formulates the syllabus of a course as per the Curriculum framework.
- (b) External experts and the Department Advisory Board are also consulted while formulating the syllabi.
- (c) The draft Curricula for each Programme shall be prepared by the Department and shall be thoroughly discussed in the respective Department and also in the College Council. The final draft will be approved by the College Council.
- (d) The draft curricula approved at the College level would then be placed for discussion and approval by the Board of Studies (BoS) of the Department/Programme. The BoS has University's nominees, Expert faculty from the leading academic Institutions, along with the Internal Faculty. The suggestions given by the BoS members are incorporated in the draft Curriculum and the BOS then recommends the Curriculum for approval by the Academic Council (AC). BoS is constituted as per the UGC Guidelines 2018.
- (e) Academic Council which examines the proposed Curricula and grant the approval is constituted as per the UGC Guidelines 2018
- (f) The Curriculum is implemented with the permission of the Governing Body.
- (g) Continuous monitoring of the academic progress is done by the HoDs and Deans and the matters of concern are brought to the College Council/BoS.
- (h) The College Council oversees the academics and discipline on a day to day basis.

Note: A discussion on the revision of the M. Tech Curricula was started in 2021-2022. This is to be implemented in 2022-2023. Drastic changes are expected to be brought in to facilitate Industrial Internships, Research based projects, etc.

3.3 Students' Achievements

Under the guidance of the faculty, our students have performed well in academics, research, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Following Table B shows the enumerated achievements.

5.5 Details of the Meetings of the Other Committees

5.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell

We have imbibed that the exercise of *Quality Assurance* is essential for sustaining institutional excellence. IQAC was first formed in 2015. With an increased focus on quality under autonomy and to meet the statutory requirements of the University and of the UGC under the autonomy regime, College has reconstituted the IQAC in October 2020, in the first meeting of the Governing Body, immediately after becoming autonomous. Academic audit is regularly conducted and the reports are furnished to the University. Annual submission of the Academic Quality Assurance report (AQAR) to the NAAC is also under the purview of the IQAC. During the reporting year also, IQAC has systematically made interventions in the academic and administrative processes to assure the quality. Internal Academic Audit, Internal Administrative Audit. Academic audit as per the University's norms, External Audits (Academic and Administrative audits) by a peer team comprising the leading academicians were conducted during June 2022. Coordinated the AICTE-CII survey and submitted the survey on 5.10.2021. Organized an OBE Workshop jointly with the Teaching Learning Centre (12 and 20 December 2021). Pre qualifier of NBA was submitted during December 2021. SAR was submitted on 22nd Jan 2022. MBCET is ranked as band PROMISING under the category of Colleges/ Institutes (Private/Self-Financed) (Technical) on Dec 31st 2021 based on the details submitted on 24th March 2021. 8. Others

8.1 Campus Placements

(A) For the 2017-2021 B. Tech Batch

In spite of the Pandemic situation 25 companies have made 246 offers through the campus interviews conducted online as well as offline. With more opportunities in the pipeline, it is an encouraging sign. The major recruiters include TCS, Infosys, UST Global, QBurst, Cognizant, QuEST Global and Speridian. Others who have made offers include OSPYN Technologies, Experion Technologies, InApp, H & R Block, Envestnet, PwcAc, VVDN, Sporthood, Capgemini, Tech Mahindra, Wipro, GUIDEHOUSE and Accenture etc. In total 177 students have got placed by the time the final semester has come to a close.

(B) For the 2018-2022 B. Tech Batch

Even though the Pandemic was prevailing, 27 companies have made 414 offers through the Campus interviews conducted online as well as offline. This shows a 159% increase in the placement compared to the previous year (246 numbers). Several students got multiple offers. One student of the CSE Department secured **six placement offers**, which is this season's maximum. A number of students got higher CTC offers than the average pushing them up in the employment value chain. In other branches also, there were cases of multiple offers for a number of students with higher pay offers. With more opportunities in the pipeline, it is an encouraging sign. The major recruiters include TCS, Infosys, UST Global, QBurst, Cognizant, QuEST Global

and Speridian. Others who have made offers include IBM, Microsoft, OSPYN Technologies, Experion Technologies, InApp, H & R BLOCK, Envestnet, Cappemini, Wipro, and Accenture, Byju's, Tata Elxsi, etc. In total 210 students have got placed. More are waiting to get their confirmations.

8.2 Student Internships as a quality assurance measure

Internships for the UG Programmes are integrated in the Curriculum by way of the Activity points. Students will be awarded Activity points when they complete the internships and submit the evidences for the same. Following tabulations show the accomplishments of the graduating batches in terms of their participation in the internship/industrial training during the tenure of study in the College.

8.3 Activities under Skill Development and Corporate Relations

In our pursuits to ensure the inculcation of the necessary skills in the students and also to promote the inborn talents of the students for making innovations, the College has redesigned the skill addition portfolio sometime back. This has led to the establishment of the tinkering labs and maker space for the student community under the banner of "Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Centre (IEDC)" in 2014 with a funding from Kerala Start Up Mission. With the advent of Autonomy, more focus was being given to skill development in a structured manner so that the students would acquire the necessary transferrable skills to become employable when they finish their course of study.

Many activities have been promoted during 2021-2022 also to enable the students to get the hardware and computing related skills. IEDC is facilitating such skilling activities apart from the sessions arranged separately by Departments and the professional bodies. IEDC has conducted 18 activities during 2021-2022 with the focus on "Skill Development" A quick report is given hereunder.

Skill development Programmes:

A) The **Foundational Course in Entrepreneurship** by M/s Wadhwani Foundation. The 75-hour course was held online on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays during April 2021-November 2021 from 5.00 pm to 6.00 pm. 37 students have completed the course and Practice Ventures successfully.

B) Introduction to Python

It was a 5-day Bootcamp covering the basics of Python as well as advanced Data Science Topics like Numpy, Pandas, Matplotlib etc. This Skill Development Program was exclusively for the 2nd years of our College. The classes ended with an assignment that was assigned to each student. **C) Programming using Arduino** 30-hour course conducted for all departments in online mode Collaboration discussions with vi. Indo Transworld Chamber of Commerce, Digital Workforce Management System, Sustalife Foundation and Adani Vizhinjam Port were carried out.

8.4 Entrepreneurship Development

Based on the application submitted, KSUM approved the upgradation of IEDC to TBI Application submitted to DST for iTBI is understood to be "Under Processing". The College is also having an incubation facility namely "Dr APJ Abdul Kalam Centre for Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development". The College has been conducting the Hackathons, Bootcamps, Alumni meet, Talks Entrepreneurs, etc. to make the students aware of their capacity as an innovator/entrepreneur.

9 Faculty Training and Development

9.1Teaching and Learning Centre (TLC)

The Teaching Learning Centre (TLC) has been established by the Management for focusing on the preparation of teachers for delivering the contents effectively and for their continuous professional development. It also set the ecosystem for making the learning more experiential and immersive for the students. Training of the teachers are regularly conducted. The induction of newly appointed teachers, their training, etc. are also pursued by the TLC. New thinking about imbibing the NEP 2020 was also started. Following paragraphs give a gist of the activities during 2021-2022.

(A) **NEP 2020 Focus**

Seminar on New Challenges and Opportunities for Technical Education in the context of NEP 2020-Importance of Autonomy

National Education Policy 2020 was announced by the Government of India in 2020 to give a new dimension for education with a view to promote indigenous innovations and self-reliance (Atmanirbhar Bharat). The All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) has instructed all the Higher Technical Education Institutions to ponder over the NEP 2020 and formulate action plans for the implementation of the new policy on education so that the fruits of the new policy would reach the young generation as quickly as possible. NEP 2020 is laying emphasis on quality in education, globalization and autonomy. Higher education, especially Technical education can contribute much to the indigenous innovations in Science and Technology by encouraging Research and Development. This can be given impetus, if industries are linking themselves with the institutions to engage the faculty in the R&D and revising the curriculum to make it relevant and up to date.

Autonomy in academic matters shall be a great opportunity for the institutions to plan and implement the curriculum so that the students can get the benefit of new developments and also can be recognized for their talents. Institutions shall be able to reach out to the Industry and community to transfer the benefits of their Research and Innovations. Industries and R&D organizations can also collaborate with the Autonomous Institutions in a more focused manner to jointly work on the topics of common interest.

NEP 2020 is viewed as a new opportunity for strengthening the academia of our Country. Careful planning will be needed to implement the NEP 2020 for which the Programme of Action have to be formulated by the Institutions.

In these contexts, TLC organized a Seminar on the topic, New Challenges and Opportunities for Technical Education in the context of NEP 2020-Importance of Autonomy on 23rd March 2021. The objectives of the seminar were: (1) to give an overview of the NEP 2020 (2) historical perspectives on national policies on education in India (3) discuss the avenues for quality improvement in higher technical education under NEP 2020 (4) discuss the significance of autonomy in achieving the targets of NEP 2020 in the reasonable timeframe (5) ideation on the formulation of Programme of action for implementing NEP 2020 at MBCET. The follow-up was continued in 2021-2022 while discussing the curriculum revisions.

(B) Microteaching Workshop for newly joined Faculty

TLC in collaboration with the sister concern namely Mar Theophilus Training College ventured to take the newly joined faculty to go through the microteaching sessions. This was facilitated by the Extension and Consultancy Wing of the Training College. TLC has organized a series of sessions under the title "Through the lenses of pedagogical content knowledge and instructor beliefs" on March 22, 2022, and April 12, 2022 using the above linkage.

Subsequently, the evaluation of microteaching of new faculty members was also done as part of the follow up. Subject experts and resource persons shared their valuable insights with the faculty members. Faculty members were advised on the aspects like communication skills, strategies for effective teaching, skill integration, classroom management and collaboration. The matters of technology integration in classroom teaching and use of Educational Media were also assessed during the evaluation of microteaching sessions.

(C) Orientation Programme for new Faculty

TLC has conducted an Orientation programme for the newly joined faculty on December 07, 2021. 33 members of the Faculty from various Departments have attended the session. The faculty members were also briefed about the general rules and regulations of the College.

(D) Interaction with Leading Academicians- Teaching GenZ

TLC has conducted an online Interactive session for the faculty of MBCET on "Teaching GenZ" on 08 October 2021 which enabled a discussion on the challenges in Teaching the new generation. Resource person has shared his views on "how to engage with the current generation students in class". The talk shed light on the expectations that the students have from the teachers and how the Teachers should orient their Teaching Methodology towards fulfilling those expectations.

(E) Training Programme on Outcome Based Curriculum Design (Virtual mode)

The College IQAC and TLC jointly organized an online training programme for the internal faculty on "Outcome Based Curriculum Design". Resource person was arranged from outside the College.

Date: 12/11/2021(Friday) and 20/11/2021(Saturday)

Objective: To aid the faculty in Syllabus preparation by addressing the following aspects:

How to prepare the syllabus with the outcomes in mind

- (j) What could be the effective approaches for content delivery so as to achieve the outcomes
- (ii) Moving away from the conventional practices,
- (iii) How the assessments for the courses can be done (including setting up of question papers in a meaningful way (conducting laboratories, evaluating projects, etc.).

(F) New Normal New Life: Let Us Bounce Back

TLC has organized an online Interactive session for the faculty on "New Normal New Life: Let Us Bounce Back" on 13/08/2021. A 3-hour long session was conducted to brainstorm the teachers. It has been highlighted that the Pandemic had caused massive changes to the people's daily lives, leading to many new ways and means for getting the things done. Participants noted that there was unprecedented shift in the way we live, the way we work, the way we study, the way we socialize and connect. This new normal is impacting each and every one of us in a unique way. It is normal to have feelings such as stress, anxiety, sadness and fear in times like these. The session was concluded by a resolution to accept the new norms of life and utilize suitable means for making the teaching-learning effective.

(G) OBE- An overview

TLC has conducted an in-house session on "OBE- An overview" on 9th November 2021 and also in June 2022.

10. Students' Professional Development and the Professional Bodies

11. Campus Community- Activities conducted by MBCET Staff Club

Thereafter, 20 Students from our college represented the University in different games. 13. International Conference

The College has joined hands with IEEE Kerala Section to host the International Conference on Signal Processing, Informatics, Communication and Energy Systems (SPICES) 2022 in March 2022. More than 100 research papers were presented by the researchers across the world through mainly online mode due to the pandemic. There were tutorial sessions and invited talks delivered by very leading national and international academicians during the three days of the conference. College has received technical support from Bowie State University USA and the graceful sponsorship from CSIR. College Alumni Association also has extended the financial support.

14. Alumni Affairs

The College is maintaining high regards for its alumni. There is a good number of our own

students who are members of our faculty. The Alumni Association has got registered as a charitable Society recently. It is heartening to mention that the former students are spread across the world and they extend excellent support for the welfare and placement of their current juniors. The cultural Festival Crossroads 22 could be rolled out in time because of the timely support of the Alumni Association by way of the sponsorship. Alumni Association has also sponsored the Best Project awards for all the Departments this year also similar to the previous years.
